Annual Report

As I move into my third year at Cornerstone Housing for Women, it's hard to reflect on all that has happened. It was a year of *rebuilding and recovery*.

We began the year, moving back into O'Connor, with a short-lived feeling of familiarity, calm, and home. A few short weeks passed and our shelter community was occupied by the Convoy. As we prepared for their arrival; we never could have imagined the impact on our community being over-run for 3 weeks. We could not be quiet. We pled to our community for help, to the authorities, and to all Canadians.

There was somuch precarity with the Pandemic and 2022 continued to provide us with one crisis after the next. That didn't stop our residents, our staff, and our community from finding ways to come together, to find our new normal, and to start rebuilding for our future and recovering from the years of isolation.

Our Strategic Framework provided us direction and clarity; as we rebuilt, we took the opportunity to learn from our community partners, service-users, our staff members, donors and funders. A key lesson we learned was that our serviceusers wanted to feel reflected in our mission and vision. We, with open arms, included gender-diverse folks in our mission.

Not only are we rebuilding; we are physically building to address the increased need for affordable housing in our community. The 44 Eccles Project is on-target to be completed by March 2024.

The last few years have brought the Cornerstone Community closer together; we are recovering, we are rebuilding, we our doing our part to address the increasing need for affordable and supportive housing in Ottawa. We're excited to give more women a place to call home.

I continue to be humbled and amazing by the on-going support of our donors, staff, community partners that allow us to *Recover and Rebuild*.





A MESSAGE FROMTHE BOARD CHAIR, PATRICIA HASSARD







CONVOY ON OUR FRONT STEPS



Statement: Downtown Protest's Impact on Cornerstone's Emergency Women's Shelter

February 2, 2022 - Ottawa, ON - These last six days have been extremely stressful for people experiencing homelessness and frontline staff working to support them in the downtown core.

Cornerstone's emergency shelter just returned to its downtown location a few weeks ago and is still getting situated and now, we're having to manage through this protest that is creating more barriers and retraumatizing women in the city. The residents and staff in Ottawa's women's shelter are exhausted. This protest is having consequences on the rights and wellness of the city's most vulnerable people.

Women and staff are scared to go outside of the shelter, especially women of color, being able to go outside is the only reprieve many women experiencing homelessness have and they cannot even do that. The incessant honking and noise from the trucks have caused significant anxiety and distress for staff and shelter residents. Women have admitted themselves into hospital due to the increased trauma from the noise and fear. All Shelters are having to figure out alternative plans for client transportation to any other program or hospitals in the city.

This past weekend Cornerstones operations moved to a crisis response far beyond the impacts of the Pandemic. Senior Managers working the frontlines to ensure staff and women are safe traveling to and from our shelter and residences. Supporting staff and shelter residents while they shake with fear waiting for a bus that never arrives.

Despite all this, we are living amongst the uncertainty of not knowing when this will end. After the past two years of battling through this unprecedented global pandemic, the toxic opioid epidemic, everyone is completely exhausted and cannot take one more day of this protest's added stresses.

The cost of this protest to our city for 3 days would fund our women's emergency shelter for more than an entire year, and yet this protest has cost us financial hardship. Frontline staff and healthcare workers have come to work every day for nearly two years, managing through this pandemic to provide safe, supportive services and communities to people in Ottawa who have no place to call home, and now they're having heightened fear and anxiety around coming into work over these past few days in the midst of a global pandemic. Our shelter system cannot take one more day of the consistent noise and fear.

Housing and Healthcare support is desperately needed, and this protest is only going to further our housing and homelessness crisis. We must get our city back.



"Every day my staff and I get phone calls from women asking if we have room for them. It breaks my heart, but I have to tell them we have no room and try to help them find somewhere to stay. But this furthers their belief that they are not seen, heard, or valued. We have to do more. Our shelter is breaking at the seems. I've been in the sector for more than 25 years and I can tell you, more women and gender-diverse people are homeless than ever before. We have need to take action today." MESSAGE FROM BOOTH, SENIOR PROGRAM MANAGER, ASHLEY JORDAN

2022 was a challenging year for the resident's living at Booth.

Residents had just spent the past two years isolated, without programs, with limited connection, and with rules that seemed to be changing by the minute.

By June 2022, there was hope that there was a light at the end of the tunnel. Unfortunately, **at the end of June 2022, a fire broke out in an apartment**, that forced all residents to re-locate to a City-owned community centre for several months.

Initially, residents really struggled with this change. They no longer had their own space to call home. Instead, they shared one large open space, separated by home-made dividers. What surprised me the most, was that through this experience, it only brought our Booth community closer together. This challenge forced residents to connect more, with each other, with staff, with the volunteers that came to visit. **2022 was not an easy year for Booth Street by any means, but it proved that with hope and connection, we can get through anything.** We are so appreciative of the incredible community response to help our women come home.

From the bottom of our hearts, thank you to all of those who fundraised, volunteered, or brought us donations to furnish their rooms again.



GIVING TUESDAY CAMPAIGN TO SUPPORT FOOD SECURITY AT CORNERSTONE

Food costs at Cornerstone skyrocketed this past year by 18%. Meals increased by \$1.50 per day per person. It cost \$8.44 to feed one person for one day at Cornerstone.

We serve more than 100 people daily, which rose this past year support as we nearly doubled the number of women needing food support. We know food insecurity is strongly connected to poverty, Indigeneity, race, gender, age, immigration, mobility, and sexual orientation.

This past #GivingTuesdayCA YOU made a HUGE impact in the lives of women and genderdiverse people in our shelter and housing residences.


D.H. Gordon Foundation generously matched all donations given towards our #GivingTuesdayCA campaign up to \$20,000! We are so incredibly grateful for their support. Our goal was to raise \$40,000 to cover the increase in food cost and operational support to help with the increase in food insecurity across our residences.

With D.H. Gordon's matching gift of \$20,000 we were able to bring in just over \$100,000! INCREDIBLE!

So where did these funds go?

They went to the hike of food costs in 2022 - directly creating nutritious meals. The funds went to bringing on another full time Chef for a one-year contract to support the 2100 meals a week we're creating. Plus, the Food Manager was able to create a monthly food market for residents at Princeton to give women them better access to affordable and nutritious meals they otherwise would not be able to afford. The program also provides education to the women on how to create meals that will fill you and be nutritious.

We did all of this because of you! Thank you for filling our hearts and our plates. Thank you to everyone who made a gift towards our Food program!



RESIDENT HIGHLIGHT

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SUSON AND SHARON RECONNECTED

You gave me my mom back.

I grew up in Nova Scotia with my mom who had schizophrenia and bipolar disorder, but we didn't know it at the time. When you're young you think your life is normal. I know I did.

As normal as I thought our life was, I knew it wasn't right.

When I was 8 years old, my mom left our abusive father and took us to live with my



grandmother who was very controlling of our mother and an alcoholic. I never had a bedtime routine or set meal times growing up. It was tough. When I was 13 years old I was put into foster care until I turned 18 years old. I always wanted a better relationship with my mom.

Cornerstone Housing for Women helped my mom blossom into the beautiful person she has always been, which was masked because of her mental illness.


The staff validated her, they didn't make her feel judged. They helped her light to shine brightly. After years of trauma, being in and out of hospitals, or under the control of another person, she finally found her home, she finally found herself again.

My mom moved into Cornerstone's Booth Residence in 2010 and she was genuinely happy for the first time – in a long time. She lived here happily until her health declined, she needed more specialized health care and peacefully passed away in 2016.

She truly blossomed while living at Booth Street.

For my entire life, I always wanted to have a good relationship with my mom, but it was dysfunctional at times.

Cornerstone is not just helping that one resident. They're healing relationships. They're helping families, and when you help families you're helping communities.





There was no shortage of strength, adaptability, and compassion this past year. Our staff continued to work tirelessy on the front lines ensuring people in crisis got the appropriate care needed.

Last year, our organization once again had to navigate the pandemic protocols, policies, and resident care. Being on the frontlines has been difficult for all, but especially those on the front lines. There is a huge staffing shortage across our sector. There is approximately 1 in 4 staff available to work in our sector, this makes providing anything more than essential care difficult. The Human Resources team continued to work hard on increasing staffing levels, welcoming nine new relief staff since the fall of last year.

Our staff continued to find innovative solutions to recover and rebuild the programming and services across our organization.

People that work in the service sector are incredible at finding the calm in the storm. **Our staff showed up to every crisis with innovative solutions, and compassion.** We moved residents from our shelter operations at the Heron Physical Distancing Centre back to our home on O'Connor after two years of being in different locations. This was no small task. They also got residents through a city wide occupation, providing support to residents and each other. Our entire community also came together to support residents after a fire that occurred at our Booth Street Residence. **We are continually grateful for our staff.**

We also successfully entered collective bargaining with our union partner, CUPE this past fall. Bargaining was productive and constructive with no labour disruptions. It led to a historic moment, where a new collective agreement was reached and both of our unions molded to form one. This has allowed for increased flexibility and support for staff across the organization.

In the fall we also conducted a visioning workshop at our first staff day away in over two years. More than 95% of staff came to the visioning day. **It was so nice to reconnect and focus on how we rebuild and recover tfrom years of isolation.**

Cornerstone Housing for Women has to raise \$1 million every year just to operate our emergency shelter. Plus we have four supportive housing residences that give a permanent, affordable and safe home to 110 women and gender diverse people.

Our programs would not be possible without you!

OTTAWA COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

Cornerstone was able to work in partnership with Ottawa Inner City Health (OICH) to hire a Peer Support Worker in the fall of 2022. This muti-year funding has allowed us to learn from OICH's expertise in harm reduction and peer work and to create our very own harm reduction framework and policy. Over the pandemic and into 2022 Cornerstone saw a rise in substance use at our emergency shelter and knew we had to move to a harm reduction based service model. This peer worker has led the shelter staff and residents in nalaxone training; helped to create our new policy and supported resident initiatives and meetings.



ALL MY RELATIONS

This is our third year of receiving funding from the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa's All My Relations committee. This grant allowed Cornerstone to continue its longstanding partnership with Minwaashin Lodge who leads our Indigenous and Cultural Services program support. The grant enables the ongoing, intrinsic collaboration with Minwaashin Lodge through which we benefit not only from an Indigenous Elder but a fulsome compliment complement of supports and services including: Traditional Support Worker; Addiction Workers; Housing First Workers; Doula; Legal support.



As we reflect on the year that was 2022, it sure was a mixed bag of tricks for the Volunteer Program at Cornerstone! We came into 2022 still under significant COVID-19 restrictions and a very limited number of volunteers returning to their assignments. Of course, our amazing Board of Directors continued to guide the organization through our strategic framework from behind the scenes, as did our incredible Young Professionals Advisory Board (YPAB).

We also were so lucky to have the support of members of our corporate community who stood up without hesitation to help when needed! Many thanks to our friends at Turner & Townsend for their support after our fire at Booth Street and to Petro Canada for helping us beautify our Princeton location. Special shout out to friend Gavin Lumsden and his group of folks who never forget the women of Cornerstone with generous donations of food and treats.

As the fall and winter of 2022 approached and COVID restrictions were beginning to ease we were able to welcome back some of program volunteers. The residents were thrilled to have things like Bingo, Arts & Crafts, hair cutting and friendly visits just to name a few come back in person. The sun was beginning to shine again at Cornerstone with the return of volunteers. We have lots of hope that 2023 will bring stabilization and growth back to our volunteer program!

For the year 2022 we were still able to record over 3000 hours of volunteer service. We truly have an amazing, dedicated community of support in our volunteers. THANK YOU!

Throughout 2022 we supported the academic placements of 12 students. Five of those were short term placements with the University of Ottawa, School of Nursing, five from Algonquin College, one from Laurentian University and one from Willis College. All placements were successful and we're pleased that we were able to hire four of the five Algonquin students who are now part of the Cornerstone staff family.



SPIRITUAL CARE TEAM



The Spiritual Care program supports residents in a variety of ways from weekly small group activities, volunteer friendly phone visits and individual counselling chaplain visits, other Spiritual Care special events and it produces a monthly inspiration (HOPE) publication in French and English.

The chaplain meets residents where ever they are at the shelter, in the supportive houses and goes to visit them in when they are in hospital. This year, the Young Professional Advisory Board for Cornerstone Housing for Women was ambitious in their fund raising/support efforts. With two completed fund-raising events so far, the YPAB was able to raise \$3,880 through the Flower to Empower event and Summer Mixer, while our CNOY team raised \$1,205 making it a grand total of \$5,085.00! We also participated in various community markets and some members volunteered in resident programming. Love arrives and in its train come ecstasies old memories of pleasure ancient histories of pain. Yet if we are bold, love strikes away the chains of fear from our souls.


We are weaned from our timidity In the flush of love's light we dare be brave And suddenly we see that love costs all we are and will ever be. Yet it is only love which sets us free.


