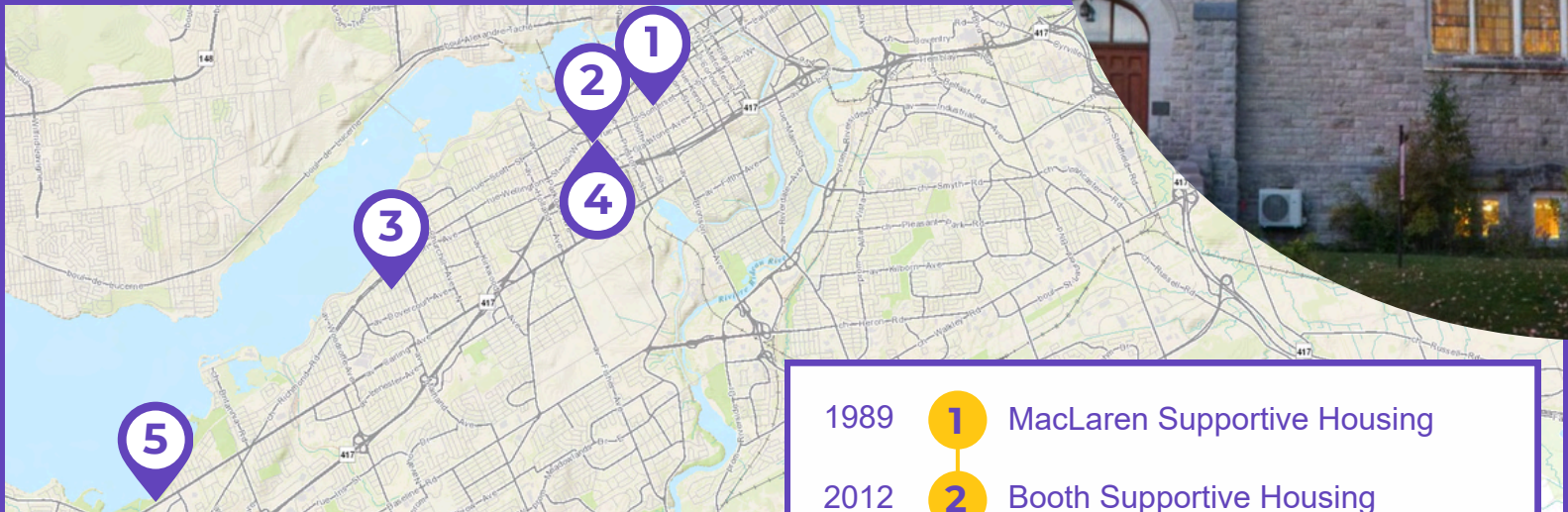


Director General, Victoria Scott

OUR HERSTORY

Cornerstone Housing for Women began with three cots in the basement of All Saints Church in Sandy Hill in 1983. It was the first women's only shelter in Ottawa. Over the last 40 years, we have expanded our programs and services across the city to continue to meet the growing need of women and gender-diverse individuals experiencing homelessness.



Today, we are proud to be providing emergency shelter for up to 165 women and gender-diverse individuals every night; and safe, permanent housing with integrated supports for more than 150 women across our four supportive housing communities.

OTTAWA STATS

The number of women and gender-diverse people experiencing homelessness continues to rise. The average market rent is more than \$2000 a month. How can someone living on ODSP, who receives a maximum of \$1,400 or someone on OW receiving a maximum of \$733 per month afford rent? **The system is forcing people to remain in the homelessness sector.** We need to create more affordable and supportive housing in our city.

NATIONAL STATS

The shelter and housing system is failing women. **Women's shelter services are underfunded and overcapacity.** Nationally, women make up 36% of people experiencing homelessness. Yet, there are only 13% of shelter beds dedicated to women. **We need a system that centres women and gender-diverse people's experiences.**

YOUR IMPACT ON SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

MacLaren Residence

MacLaren reopened its common space, allowing residents to reconnect, participate in programming, and enjoy shared experiences like movie and game nights. Helping to rebuild a strong, supportive, and safe community environment.

Our programming is designed to foster independence—teaching essential life skills such as cooking, budgeting, and daily living skills.

MacLaren also planted a new garden to brighten up the neighbourhood.

Booth Residence

We were thrilled that our common rooms on the second and third floors got a makeover by IKEA.

The refreshed spaces allow residents to feel pride and dignity as they enjoy their new space. These spaces are essential for fostering connection and healing. We were also able to put in new air conditioning in the common spaces. During the heat of the summer, this was essential to reducing heatstroke and allowed residents to come together.



YOUR IMPACT ON SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

Eccles Residence

We're proud to introduce an addictions support group led by our staff. This initiative provides a safe, supportive environment where individuals can begin or continue their recovery journey.

The group fosters connection, reduces isolation, and promotes healing through shared experiences. We are excited to have Minwaashin regularly, along with the introduction of healing circles in partnership with Jenni's Lodge.

These culturally grounded programs create space for reflection, healing, and reconnection.

Princeton Residence

Princeton is partnering with the Ottawa U Community Legal Clinic to provide targeted legal support to residents.

This collaboration brings legal services directly to tenants facing complex, overlapping challenges, helping reduce barriers such as cost and delayed access to assistance. This service helps stabilize tenancies and empower residents.

We partner with Ottawa Inner City Health to offer a harm reduction service to residents one day per week. This service is critical in improving safety, stability, and overall well-being for residents.



GIVING HOPE

EMERGENCY SHELTER

575

women and gender-diverse people served in 2025

In 2025, Cornerstone's emergency shelter supported **575 women and gender-diverse individuals** - an increase of 28% with 408 people returning. Demonstrating the ongoing gaps in stable, long-term housing. While the length of stay remained consistent, the needs of those we serve became more complex. We are the place people turn to when they have nowhere else to go. By providing basic needs for women in crisis, they can focus on their healing instead of worrying about where they will stay or where their next meal will come from.

GIVING HOPE

EMERGENCY SHELTER

Staff responded to 383 emergency service calls, a sharp increase from 236 the year prior, driven by more frequent mental health crises and rising opioid use, primarily fentanyl. The rise in overdoses and complex mental health needs underscores the urgency of a compassionate, harm reduction approach that prioritizes care over consequences.

Providing support to residents with substance use disorders and complex mental health needs is only possible through strong partnerships. Pinecrest-Queensway Community Health Centre improves access to essential healthcare, while Ottawa Inner City Health provides daily, life-saving harm reduction support. The Royal connects residents to critical mental health care.

As needs rise, so does our support. Investing in staff training Community-based supports are essential to responding to the increasingly complex needs of people experiencing homelessness.

Spiritual Care

Rev. Canon Hilary Murray, Clinical Chaplain—priest, social worker, listener, and bringer of calm in the chaos. **She and a team of 6 dedicated volunteers supported clients for 30 hours of group programming.** Her work blends clinical care with community connection. She creates spaces of healing, belonging, and laughter—welcoming all, regardless of faith.

Staff Wellness - Clinical Services Specialist

This year, **the Clinical Services Specialist worked to strengthen Cornerstone’s commitment to safe, inclusive, and trauma-informed housing for women.** They did this by standardizing clinical practices, establishing clear policies and frameworks, and providing staff training on psychological safety and trauma-informed care, de-escalation, and diversity, and more. The Clinical Specialist and the Clinical Chaplain support staff after critical incidents and accumulated stress.

NOURISH TO FLOURISH

FOOD SERVICES

Last year, Cornerstone provided over 270,000 nourishing meals across all our programs. Rising inflation continues to place a significant strain on our food program. **The cost of our standard basket of ingredients increased by 18% last year, but with your support, we were able to provide nutritious meals to residents across Cornerstone.** As our demand for nutritious, culturally appropriate food needs rose, you were there to help. We are incredibly grateful to our neighbours, restaurants, local businesses, farms, and larger box stores who stepped up to help with our increasing food expenses.

DREAMS TO REALITY

We are grateful for the incredible investment by RONA to improve the security and safety of our shelter and supportive housing residences. This has made a tremendous difference in the lives of the people who call Cornerstone home.

Also, a BIG thank you to our facilities team for accomplishing so much in such a short period of time. They could not have done this important work without our incredible donors. Thank you!

Some key milestones that occurred in 2025 included:

- New roof on Princeton (approximately \$95,000)
- Shelter received a new Gazebo in the backyard area (approximately \$20,000)
- Three new pairs of washers and dryers were purchased from RONA (\$20,000); one set was set up at Booth, and two sets went to Princeton.
- A front fence was put up in front of Eccles for safety and security purposes (approximately \$18,000)

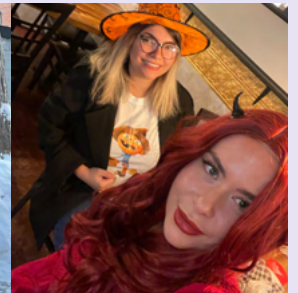

Washes over you and me**

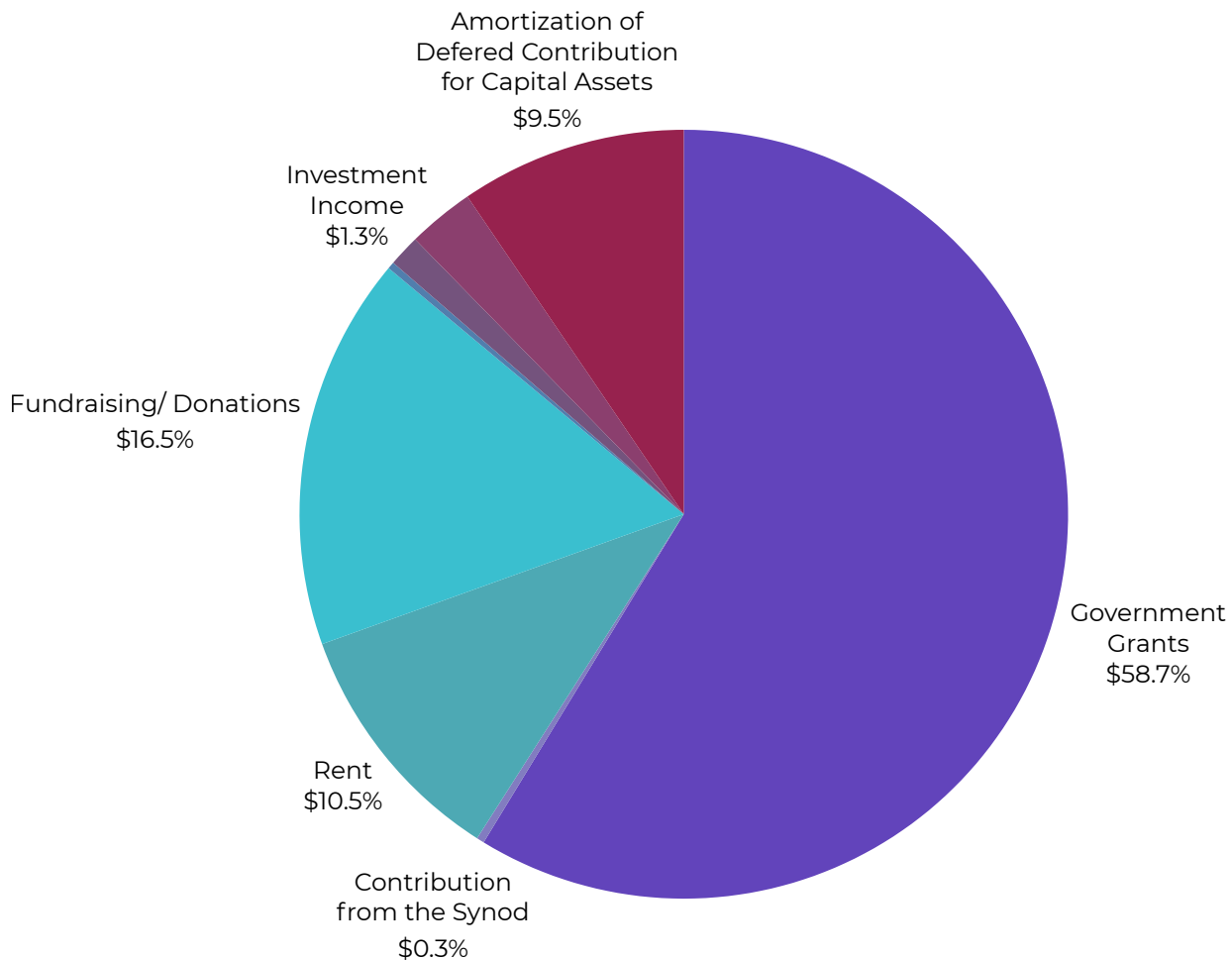

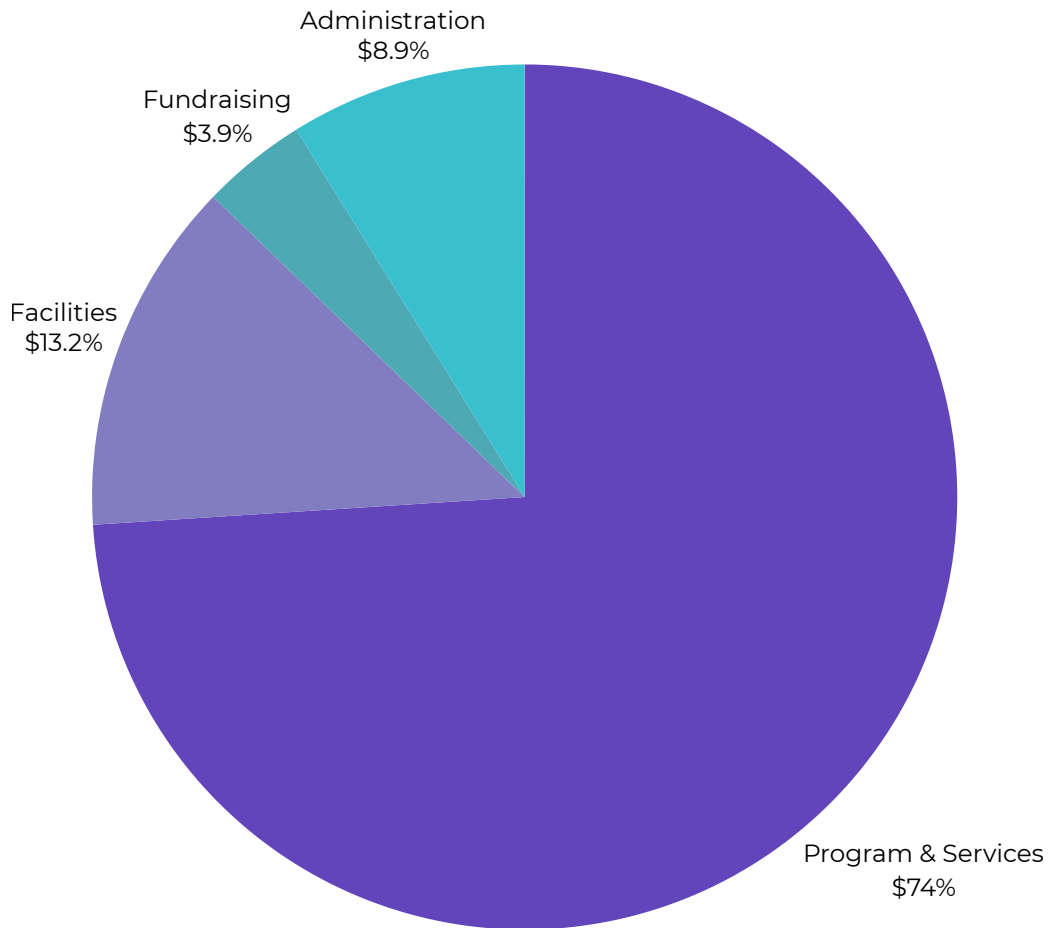
